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FROM THE RABBI



Once again, bucolic summer is upon us here in Vermont. We cherish these weeks of warmth and sunshine, whether we are able to hike into the mountains or simply gaze upon them and the beautiful lake in our midst. Yet the realities abide, of a world

tossed and turned, whatever the weather. Indeed, one of those realities is the fate of the weather itself.

As I (and I hope you as well) relax a bit without the threat of ice and cold, it is important not to lose sight of significant developments in our world which impact our lives now and will affect us in the months and years to come. Three examples come to mind.

- (1) Probably for the first time since the Shoah, Jews in Europe fear once again for their safety and security. The recent European Parliament elections resulted in the rise of right wing and anti-Semitic parties. When four people were murdered shortly before the European elections in the Jewish Museum of Brussels, I thought of a conversation I had about twenty years ago, in Dachau, Germany, with the mother and father of a young Carmelite nun living in the convent next to the Dachau memorial site. They spoke to me of their beginning to see and feel once again in their native Belgium the malignancy of anti-Semitism, fueled by hatred of the State of Israel. Twenty years later, let us be aware of the nature of chants at "pro-Palestinian" demonstrations in Europe where "Hamas, Hamas, Jews into the gas" is becoming a common slogan.
- (2) Back here in the United States, the effects of unchecked greed are being felt very personally, particularly by the most vulnerable of us. Many elders, including members of Ohavi Zedek, currently depend upon Medicare for health insurance. Unbeknownst to most of us, Medicare's rules have been rewritten to save the government money at the expense of the life-time savings of elders. For example (and we are grateful to OZ member Lois Whitmore for bringing this to our attention), you can be admitted to the hospital now, literally be an "in-patient," but you can be treated while in the hospital as an "observation status" outpatient. One consequence, which has cost members of our congregation many thousands of

dollars, is that after your hospitalization, you don't qualify under Medicare for skilled nursing facility care. Indeed, the nursing facility may only accept you with an up-front payment of thousands of dollars. It is a threat of a different order from what's going on in Europe, yet a threat nonetheless to one's basic security.

(3) Even closer to home, here at our congregation we have a tradition of caring for each other after we die through the devoted work of the *Chevra Kadisha*, the Jewish burial society through which three or four of us gather to prepare, lovingly and sensitively, the dead for burial. We always are in need of volunteers for the fulfillment of this mitzvah. Right now we are in great need of more women to volunteer. Doing a *taharah* (the ritual preparation of the body) is a powerful experience, the steps of which are easily learned. Michael Goldstein and Deb Lashman lead the effort and Deb is in particular need of more volunteers (deblashman@burlingtontelecom.net).

There are many ways in which we can nurture our own well being and the well being of others. Some are closer to home than others, yet in all ways we are called as Jews to be vigilant and persistent in our efforts *l'takayn olam b'malkhut Shadai*—our siddur translates it, "May *tikkun olam*, mending the world, make manifest Your mighty dominion." A prayer for any and all seasons!

FROM THE PRESIDENT



want to start out by thanking Roz Grossman, who has stepped off the board, for her dedicated service. She will be continuing as an active volunteer at OZ, and we are grateful for her hard work and wisdom. Jeff Potash has agreed to step in

and join the board and I very much look forward to working with him once again.

At the Congregational Meeting on June 8, Jeff's board membership was approved, and we voted on the 2014/15 budget. We also had a fruitful discussion on the issue of membership and voting. Both the budget and the following change to the bylaws overwhelmingly passed.

Our new bylaws state that non-Jewish spouses/ partners are considered members and may vote on most, but not all, issues. Specifically, "only members of the Jewish faith as determined by the standards set by the Rabbinical Assembly's Committee on Jewish Law and Standards and as interpreted by the senior rabbi of the Congregation, may vote to elect clergy members or on religious issues, as determined by the Rabbi and the Religious Committee." Jewish spouses/partners may vote on other non-religious issues.

Please read the following letter from Keith Kasper, husband of Fran Pomerantz. Keith asked me to share this with the congregation.

As a newly enfranchised member of the Ohavi Zedek Community, I want to express my gratitude to all of you who came out on a lovely Sunday morning to support myself and similarly situated non-Jewish spouses of OZ members. I sincerely thank you for your efforts over the course of this lengthy and difficult process. More importantly, I want to take this opportunity to reach out to those members of the congregation who were equally and adamantly opposed to these bylaw amendments. I fervently believe that these bylaw amendments will not adversely affect your relationship with OZ. I doubt you will notice any difference at all in the day to day activities of the Synagogue. We

non-Jewish spouses will still be there picking up our children from Hebrew School, volunteering our time in support of congregational activities, as well as financially supporting OZ in its myriad endeavors. We have not changed at all as a result of this vote. Indeed, I am skeptical that any of us would have stopped doing what we have always done if these by law amendments had failed again. Today, I am asking those of you who objected to these amendments to please keep doing what so many have done for generations now: Maintain your active support of the Synagogue. We all need you and your continued participation in this congregation to promote and strengthen OZ for many years to come. Again, thank you one and all for your ongoing support of our entire community now and in the future.

PROFILE: ERIC & KAREN CORBMAN



When the time came for the Corbmans to retire and leave their home of 25 years in New Jersey, Eric did not want to move north and Karen vetoed a move to the south. "One of us was nicer and gave in," Karen says, with a nod of appreciation

toward her husband of 30 years. Their subsequent resettlement in Burlington in 2012 is one that both are enjoying immensely.

On a beautiful sunny day in late May it was easy to see why. They live in a three-bedroom condo at Northshore in the New North End, where every unit overlooks the bike path and the lake. We sat on their expansive deck nibbling cheese and fruit while we talked. Eric and Karen were not complete strangers to Vermont, having spent the last week of every summer at Smugglers Notch when their three daughters were growing up. "We often found ourselves in Burlington," Karen notes. "There was always something to do there – and several book stores to keep the girls happy."

Eric, 62, and Karen, 64, were introduced by a mutual friend in 1983. Their backgrounds couldn't be more dissimilar. Eric's grandparents on both sides were immigrants from Russia in the early 1900s. At the New York Public Library he researched the steamship *Volturno*, on which his maternal forebears sailed to America, and learned that the ship sank just one year after their journey. "There was a fire, and many passengers jumped into the rough sea." In contrast to what happened on the Titanic, the fire was extinguished and those who remained on board survived, Eric discovered, while those in the water did not. Everyone in steerage, all presumably immigrants, made it.

His grandfather, Max Staniloff, found work in the garment business on the Lower East Side of Manhattan. When the company opened a facility in Rockland County, Max was offered a promotion to manage this new factory, and he relocated his family to the Spring Valley area. Eric was born in 1952 and grew up in a neighborhood of Spring Valley called The Hill, whose population was part Jewish, part African American. There were fewer Jewish families by the time his family moved to nearby Monsey when Eric was 10. His only sibling, a brother just one year older, passed away in 1974 at the age of 23.

Eric's father worked in New Jersey as a ceramic engineer in the steel-making industry. His mother, who studied illustration at the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, painted many of the works now on the walls of the Corbmans' Burlington condo. Eric's family belonged to a Reform temple, where the boys became bar mitzvah and their mother taught art in the religious school, as well as in local senior citizen centers.

Eric earned a Bachelor's degree in math and a Master's in applied mathematics and statistics at Stony Brook on Long Island. He took a job as a draftsman in his dad's firm in 1976, but the work didn't appeal to him. "I started to hang around the computer center helping to write some programs," he says, "and soon I was offered a job as a programmer in the computer department." While his job was in New Jersey, Eric lived in Manhattan with a series of roommates. In 1977 his life became simpler when he accepted a position in information technology at Tiffany & Co. in Manhattan.

At the same time, Karen Parchem, a native of Indiana, was living in New Jersey and working at Bell Laboratories/AT&T. The eldest of nine siblings in a Roman Catholic family, she had been hired after graduating from Indiana University, where she majored in mathematics and economics. Given the choice of a job in either the Illinois or New Jersey facility, she chose to move to the East Coast. After working a year, Karen took advantage of a Bell Labs program that allowed her to complete a Master's in applied math at NYU's Courant Institute of Mathematics.

The Catholicism of her youth was a very conservative Midwestern version, she says, and she became disaffected as an adult, breaking away in the '60s during the turbulent Viet Nam era. While she never regretted that decision, she found that she missed the sense of community that organized religion provided. Over the next several decades,

after seeking out a number of Protestant churches, she discovered Judaism through some Jewish friends. Jewish values spoke to her, Karen says, and she felt as though she'd found a spiritual home. She began to attend services in a Conservative synagogue, but was hesitant to make a commitment. After four or five months she took a "half-step" and asked the rabbi for some books to read. Upon receiving her mother's blessing, Karen became a Jew by choice. Her formal conversion took place in 1983.

A few months later she met Eric. They were introduced at a party by an AT&T officemate of Karen's who was a good friend of Eric's from Stony Brook. Eric was entertaining two young children at the party who, Karen assumed, belonged to him. After they were claimed by their parents, she realized two things, she says: "Eric was single, and he liked kids. On top of that," she adds with a smile, "he came well recommended." They were married the following year. Tiffany's IT department moved from New York to Parsippany, New Jersey, and in 1987, when their second daughter was on the way, Eric and Karen purchased a house in the nearby town of Randolph.

Eric remained at Tiffany for 14 years, during which time he earned an MBA at the Stern School at NYU. He spent the remainder of his IT career in the apparel industry, first at Alexander Julian Men's Sportswear, then at Aris Isotoner, and finally, for 14 years, as head of the computer department at Maggy London, a global fashion organization.

Karen stayed at Bell Labs/AT&T from 1972 to 1998, except for three years, one after the birth of each of the Corbman daughters. Although she had the "perfect job," she says, she decided that after 26 years it was time to leave. The girls were happy to have a stay-at-home mom, especially since they were able to talk their parents into getting a dog. Their Maltese, Punky, was with them for 11 ½ years; the family lost him two years before Eric and Karen moved to Vermont. Once here, they adopted Ella, a five-year-old poodle/terrier.

Their daughters, the Corbmans say, are thriving. Rachel, 29, lives in Brooklyn and will be starting a Ph.D program in women's studies at Stony Brook. She received her BA from The New School and her MA from CUNY. Marjorie, 26, is currently in Boston, but is moving to New York to pursue a Ph.D in theology

at Fordham, having earned her BA from Holy Cross and her MA from the University of London SOAS. Jessica, 23, a graduate of Idaho State University, is an elementary school teacher in Monroe, WA, outside of Seattle.

Rachel based her Master's thesis on a diary written by Eric's mother in 1936. Although she died when Rachel was only 6, grandmother and granddaughter had been very close. The diary and another journal that she discovered helped Rachel better understand the era: her grandmother wrote about a new game named Monopoly, for example, and about voting for the first time "for FDR and all the other damn Democrats."

After checking out many condos in Burlington and South Burlington, it was love at first sight when the Corbmans found Northshore. "It was the view," Eric says, and Karen concurred. They purchased a unit and rented it out for a year and a half until December of 2012, when they were ready to move. Having been here now for 19 months, they love the ambiance and neighborly feel of Burlington and other towns in Vermont. And as longtime liberal Democrats, they note that the grassroots politics here reflect their values. "We feel very much at home," Eric says.

'Retirement' didn't mean 'rocking chair' for this duo. Eric joined The Edge, where he plays tennis three times a week, and in the months ahead Karen plans to be swimming in the Northshore pool. And, of course, they'll take advantage of the adjoining bike path and the lake. On the local scene, the Corbmans assisted with the COTS annual fundraiser, and they volunteer at Starr Farm dog park and at CP Smith School twice a week helping first graders with math and reading. They also enjoy the area's many cultural and community events, lending their support to the Flynn Center, the Vermont Stage Company, the Shelburne Museum and Shelburne Farms.

Eric and Karen will be planning a major trip every February (fulfilling a side agreement negotiated by Eric when he consented to move north). Over the years their travels have taken them to several cities in the US and to a number of countries in Europe. One outstanding memory of their trip to Ireland during Passover in 2012 is having attended a community seder in Dublin, a city of few Jews, but many Jewish-American students.



In the summer of 1996 they visited Israel and Egypt with their daughters, who were 11, 8 and 6 at the time. "When our El Al flight landed and *Hatikvah* was played on the loudspeakers, it was a deeply emotional experience for us," Eric says. As longtime supporters of J Street and of Brit Tzedek v'Shalom prior to their merger with J Street in 2010, he and Karen believe in a genuine two-state solution that would involve significant compromise from both the Israelis and the Palestinians. "We were proud supporters of the yeoman peacemaking effort made by Secretary of State John Kerry," Eric says.

Although they'd been involved with Reform, Conservative and Reconstructionist congregations in New Jersey over the years, once here the Corbmans were drawn to Ohavi Zedek by the many events they found on the OZ website. The first Lunch & Learn program they attended, the very month they arrived in town, was a talk by Burlington Mayor Miro Weinberger.

Since joining the synagogue, Eric and Karen have been attending Friday evening services and the potlucks that follow at Rabbi Jan's. The first time they showed up (just six days after moving to Vermont!) they were recruited by a very persuasive Rabbi Jan to be part of her Thursday evening minyan team. They are also involved with the *G'Mach* effort, led by Judy Danzig, to supply meals to members of our community in need of temporary support, and have been active members of the Interfaith/Social Action Committee, through which they organized a discussion that led to a lively debate on some of the more provocative chapters of the Avi Shavit book, *My Promised Land: The Triumph and Tragedy of Israel*.

At the May meeting of the Social Action Committee the Corbmans agreed to assume co-chairmanship, as current chair Jeff Potash steps down. In an email, Eric wrote, "We are very honored to accept this opportunity...We look forward to working both within and without the Ohavi Zedek community to promote the Jewish core value of *tikkun olam*."

It goes without saying that he and Karen have truly settled into their new home.

MURAL UPDATE

Over the past year you've heard a great deal about our efforts to save the Lost Shul Mural. Over two dozen members of our community, led by Aaron Goldberg and Jeff Potash, have dedicated hundreds of hours to save the mural. Since last August when the project officially publically launched we've raised over \$160,000 (as of print time). We've spread the word far and wide with articles in the local press, The Forward, the New York Times, and even a story on NPR.

At this point the first two phases of the project, have been completed, including the initial conservation of the mural in place. Right now all efforts are focused on fundraising and planning for the move of the mural to Ohavi Zedek.

We still need your help. If you have been considering making a donation to the project now is the time as we push to raise the needed funds to move the mural this fall. If you have already made a gift or do not have the resources to donate, you can still be a great help. We need to continue spreading word of this project far and wide to generate more support across the country and the world. Tell your Jewish relatives. Ask them to share the project with their local Jewish community. Have a connection to a Jewish foundation or family philanthropic fund? Let them know about the project or put us in touch with them. Share the project news article on social media like Facebook and Twitter. Every person that helps us get the word out vastly increases our reach and the likelihood for our completing fundraising for the move this summer. Thank you for your time and help! Together we can save the mural!

The possibilities are exciting, but I cannot do it alone.

We are extremely lucky to have such a wonderful Jewish youth group in our community. Young Judaea is an important way of uniting Jewish youth from around the state, a place where they can come together and have fun while strengthening their Jewish identities. Participants come from OZ, Temple Sinai, Chabad, Beth Jacob (in Montpelier), JCOGS (Jewish Community of Greater Stowe) and local Chavurah groups, as well as unaffiliated Jewish youth. We have a truly wonderful and welcoming group of kids and it's so nice to watch the bonds of friendship grow among kids from our different communities.


