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FROM THE RABBI



So once again we come 'round to Pesah. Rosh Hashanah may be our new year for personal reflection. The first of the month of Nisan is the new year for us as a people, for we were forged as a people through our liberation from slavery in the month of Nisan.

Our sages ask why it was time for the children of Israel to leave Egypt. There is a Chasidic tradition that the reason was "God felt that the children of Israel were becoming accustomed to their burdens;" that is, that they were forgetting what it is to be free. They truly were becoming slaves.

What do we need to do when we sense that we are becoming accustomed to our burdens? What are the first steps we must take in order to accept the fact that we are in great danger of not knowing how we are losing control over our own lives? To begin with, we have to recognize the powerful role denial plays in shaping our consciousness. Enslaved? Controlled? Who, me?

Threatened by the dawning consciousness that we are not free, It is easy for us to lose self respect and begin a downward spiral into the kind of self contempt that is itself enslaving. At such a time, we are challenged to face up to the reality that we confront. We are losing our freedom and are in danger of losing more of it unless we accept full-on what is happening and come to the consciousness of one who is not free.

All over the world people are coming to that consciousness. Whatever the political system, humanity now is called to rebel against assaults on freedom wherever they are to be found. It remains to be seen how we Jews, for whom the experience of servitude and liberation is the defining theme of our peoplehood—it remains to be seen the role we will play as humanity struggles to remain free. As we prepare to sit down for our *sedarim*, we can ponder the ways in which we may have become accustomed to our burdens.



FROM THE PRESIDENT

want to talk to you about rabbinical succession and the issue of voting at Ohavi Zedek.

Rabbinical Search Committee

I'm happy to announce that I've named Lee Lichtenstein as the Chair of the Rabbinic Search Committee. And I'm even happier to announce that he's accepted! Most of you know Lee—he currently serves on the Religious Committee (formerly as chair) and is one of our regular gabbaim every Shabbat morning. (Note: the gabbaim are responsible for checking the accuracy of those leyning Torah.) He served on the OZ board as board liaison to the committee that hired Rabbi David and co-chair of the committee that hired Rabbi Jan. Additionally, for the past three years he has sat on the Nominating Committee for new board members. Lee and I are beginning the search process by naming the members of the search committee. Our goal is to carefully select congregants who represent the many different constituencies here at OZ.

As you know, we've spent the last year reaching out to the congregation about this search. We held a Town Hall meeting, sent out a written survey, and telephoned each congregant to hear your thoughts and concerns. You told us that you wanted a rabbi skilled at pastoral care, an educator, someone with excellent people skills who has the ability to attract and engage young families and work well with children. You also told us that you want us to continue our tradition of diversity and inclusiveness, and that our new rabbi should have a high quality and depth of Jewish learning.

With that in mind, on February 18 the board met and made the decision to begin our search through the Conservative Movement (The United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism). This allows us to have access to graduates of several highly-regarded institutions, including the Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS). JTS is known as a preeminent institution of Jewish higher education that combines rigorous academic scholarship and a commitment to Jewish tradition with a vision that is egalitarian, passionate and engaged with modern culture.

We know that we will receive applications from outside of the Conservative Movement, and we are not prohibited from accepting these applications. We recognize that the right rabbi for our congregation may come from one of many exceptional institutions or backgrounds, and our intention is to allow ourselves as much flexibility as possible.

Voting at OZ

You should all have received the survey we sent out concerning voting rights at OZ. You can access it at www.ohavizedek.org/survey. If you haven't yet filled it out, I encourage you to do so, using the code on the back of my letter of February 12 . If you misplaced the letter, please contact Peter Pelaia for your code.

On Sunday, February 23 we had a Town Hall style meeting on this topic. There were differing and strong opinions expressed, but I'm so happy that everyone listened to one another with respect. It was interesting to me that everyone was united in their interest in a strong future for our Jewish community, although there were some different ideas about how to get there. No decisions were made—this was simply an opportunity for folks to express their views and listen to their fellow congregants. Many thanks to Michael Schaal, who did a wonderful job of facilitating. If you were not able to attend this meeting and would like us to schedule another, please let me know. This issue will be discussed at the next official Congregational Meeting in June (date to be determined). And, as always, in addition to the survey, I am always open to discussing this with anyone - vivienrabin@gmail.com, 802-524-5507.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Label Warnings

As you have just read in Vivien Rabin Brown's article, the rabbinic search is getting underway in the coming months and we will begin that search by evaluating candidates through the Conservative Movement

(United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism or USCJ). USCJ requires that initially we search exclusively through their candidate pool until and unless we are unsatisfied with the candidates who come forward, at which point we would be able to consider non-USCJ candidates.

We spent 2013 looking for an answer to that oft asked question here at Ohavi Zedek, the most critical question we needed to answer before searching for a new spiritual leader: Who are we? Many of you have asked what the answer to that question is, wanting to know if we are going to remain a Conservative synagogue affiliated with the USCJ. Or if we are going to remain conservative but unaffiliated. Or if we are going to perhaps opt to self-identify in some other way. Some of us are afraid we will change too much, some that we will change too little, and all of us are concerned with the future of our *kehillah*, our sacred community, and of Judaism in Vermont and in the world.

Labels are always dangerous, for individuals and especially for communities. They diminish us by their inadequacy to describe the sum total of our kehillah. With hundreds of voices comprising our shared identity there is no simple label to apply. Our members come from diverse backgrounds, within Judaism and without. Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist, Renewal, post-denominational, spiritual, mystical, agnostic. Those who were raised as Jews and those who chose Judaism later. Those who seek friendship, learning, and/or worship. Families that contain Jews and non-Jews, and perhaps those who are uncomfortable with religion altogether and equate their Judaism to shared values, culture and ideals, rather than to God. The differences go on and on but our diversity and our love for one another is who we are. It is our strength and defines our kehillah in a way no label can.


The search for our next rabbi will be informed by the values you have shared, in your words and actions. Just as no one label fits our kehillah, we will not be seeking a rabbi based solely on his or her label. We will choose our next spiritual leader together, based on the sum total of who he or she is. We will find a rabbi who can continue to forge our diversity into our strength, as Rabbi Joshua has done. We will find a rabbi who embraces our differences while remaining committed to including all members of our community, welcoming all who seek to find their place here. We will hire a rabbi who will honor our traditions while remaining open to embracing our most traditional value of all: change. We won't settle for a rabbi that doesn't complement us. And we won't accept a rabbi that doesn't challenge us to grow and improve. So long as s/he fits our kehillah, will love, cherish and nurture our diversity, the label will not matter.

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PROFILE: MINDY EVNIN



amily lore has it that 14-month-old Mindy Wall flew into her father's arms when they met for the first time in 1946. Captain Max B. Wall had just returned from a tour of duty as a chaplain in World War II, having served with the Ninth Infantry

Division during the Battle of the Bulge and then worked with displaced persons liberated from the concentration camps. Mindy lived with her mom, Miriam, and her maternal grandparents in Fall River, MA during her dad's Army service.

The postwar position he accepted – for one year only, he had promised his wife – was as spiritual leader of Ohavi Zedek Synagogue in the 'boonies': Burlington, Vermont, a position he went on to hold for over 40 years. Instead of moving closer to family, as expected, he and Miriam (Mimi) established a life in Burlington, becoming pillars of the Jewish community, the ecumenical community, the Greater Burlington community and the State of Vermont as well over those four-plus decades and beyond.

They raised their three daughters, Mindy, now 69, Naomi, 65, and Shira, 60, in their home on North Street, just a couple of blocks from the synagogue. Mindy recalls a close family life, with the warmth and humor of loving parents who allowed their daughters to do what they wanted with their lives. She was enrolled in Hebrew School when she entered elementary school, one year ahead of when most kids started their Hebrew School studies. "That turned out to be a good thing," she says. "The kids were all a year older, but it was a large class and I made many friends." Only one of that group, Sherry Levin Star, still lives in Burlington.

Despite their minority status, the Jewish kids experienced no anti-Semitism at Taft School that Mindy can recall. And the fact that she was the rabbi's daughter was a non-issue among her friends, she maintains, until she and her contemporaries were adolescents. Then parents would tell their kids, "If Rabbi and Mrs. Wall let Mindy do it, you can do it too."

Six hour/week Hebrew School, Junior Congregation on Saturdays, and a once- a-month Hebrew Circle on Shabbat with their teacher, Shimon Frost, left little time to establish friendships other than with the Jewish kids. There was also a very active Young Judaea youth group that met every Sunday afternoon, Hebrew High School classes, and weekend conventions from time to time with kids from Rutland who were members of the Vermont Jewish Youth Council.

Summers were spent in Jewish day camps and sleep-away camps, where as a youngster Mindy felt out of place. "Everyone seemed more socially sophisticated," she says. "I was the tall, gawky one from little Burlington." Still, Camp Ramah and Tel Yehudah offered wonderful summer opportunities, including training programs in Wisconsin and in the Poconos of Pennsylvania.

The colleges to which Mindy applied had to meet two important criteria: kosher food had to be available, and the school needed to be small, not "overwhelming." She chose Brandeis. While receiving a good education there, Mindy found that what she disliked about it was one of the very things she thought she wanted: its size. "I found it too small and isolated."

An American Studies major, she switched to Jewish History in order to spend her junior year in Israel with the American Friends of the Hebrew University. "Eighty-eight of us spent 10 days on a boat to get there. We had Hebrew lessons every day at a summer Ulpan, then took regular university courses. In my spare time I toured with our group, hitched around the country, and visited Israeli relatives," she says. "House parties involved ballroom dancing, and in order to fit in I took a dance class among others who were Israeli Arabs. A friend and I accepted an invitation to an Arab village, where we had a meal among the men, while the women stared at us from the doorway. It was a simpler, safer time in Israel, and the best year of my life up to that point."

Upon her return to Brandeis, Mindy focused on social work. "I always admired the part of my father's job that involved counseling," she says, "and I knew I wanted to be a therapist." Graduate school in 1967

took her to Yeshiva University's Wurzweiler School of Social Work, which was near NYU and Greenwich Village in New York City. The small town girl from Vermont found herself on home visits to the projects in Brooklyn and the Bronx, and in city hospitals, foster care agencies and group homes during the time when society was deinstitutionalizing the mentally ill and reeling from the tumultuous era of the Viet Nam War. "I had not really been politically involved until I lived in New York," Mindy says. "And my Judaism bounced all over the place during that time as well." In the early '70s she spent two summers with other city dwellers at a kosher house in the Hamptons, and in 1975 she met Michael Evnin there.

Michael worked for an international Israeli company that had offered him a position as second in command of their office in Bangkok. Mindy joined him there, and on January of 1977 they were married under a *chuppah* fashioned from a *tallit* held aloft by bamboo poles. Rabbi Wall officiated by phone, and they were attended by neighbors and Israelis from the embassy. Family members and friends joined the wedding party via conference call: Rabbi, Mimi and the Evnins in Burlington, Naomi in North Carolina, Shira and Mindy's friends in NYC, and Michael's sister in Ithaca.

Mindy and Michael remained in Thailand for three years, during which time Mindy taught Hebrew School to the children of Jewish ex-pats and refugees, served on the board of the American-British library, took an "ulpan" in Thai, and immersed herself in learning about a country whose culture was so very different from her own. Since that experience, cultural differences have been of special interest to her.

In 1980, as China opened its doors, Michael's company wanted him to head their Beijing office. He traveled back and forth for several months, after which he and Mindy spent one month there together in a hotel. Mindy recalls the country as very underdeveloped, and was skeptical about the medical care she would receive should she become pregnant. Instead of accepting the offer, they came back to the States. Business interests here took them

first to St. Louis, then back to the East Coast, where they lived in New Jersey while Michael worked in Manhattan. Having confirmed by then that Mindy would not be able to bear children, they adopted their son Mark in May of 1981, when he was just five days old. The following year the family moved to Panama, where Michael helped to develop a cocoa business for an old friend.

Returning to the States in 1984, they lived in Burlington while Michael worked on developing his own business venture in Panama with American partners. Three years later he took a position as a consultant in Washington DC, but the marriage was falling apart at that time, and Mindy opted to stay in Vermont and raise their son here. Mark went through the South Burlington school system, while Mindy found work as a social worker, first at the Howard Mental Health Center and later at the Medical Center Hospital of Vermont (now Fletcher Allen). Her current position in the Psychiatry unit enables her to maintain her own schedule. She sees adults and couples from different walks of life, and deals with such issues as depression, anxiety, trauma, marriage difficulties, and grief. "Most counseling has a component of grief," she says, "and I feel privileged to be able to help."

Halfway through his senior year in high school, Mark told his mother that he didn't feel ready to start college and wanted to enlist in the Marine Corps. With enough credits to graduate mid-term, he left for basic training in the spring of 2001 at the age of 18. He was excited to have been accepted into sniper school, and was on the island of Okinawa on 9/11, when, as we all know, the world changed... especially for those in the military.

While home on leave over Christmas in 2002, Mark told Mindy he was to be deployed to Kuwait, and on March 20 the Marines crossed into Iraq. Just two weeks later, there was a knock on Mindy's door. Her son Mark was among the first Americans and the first Vermonters to have been killed in the Iraq War, on April 3, 2003. "I went into disconnect," Mindy remembers. "It was a strange time, very

ost of us were exposed to tradition as children, but what does it mean as an adult to join and create a community that carries our people's rhythm? How does our tradition's calendar become a foundation that we can dig our roots into in order

to grow as a better and holier person – instead of the holidays seeming like 'one more thing to do?' Rabbi Zalman Shalomi-Schachter offers the following insight about living within the Jewish calendar: "Living in sync with our sacred calendar helps give us 'kivun,' direction. It keeps us from falling into forgetfulness. Living in the flow of time, joining our actions to the signposts and seasons of the year, helps us to connect with the 'shefa,' the constant outflow of grace and plentitude that underlies our very existence."

Many of the Chavurot celebrations are inspired by the cyclical pattern of the Jewish calendar, providing a community context for this exploration of our tradition's rhythm. If we practice regularly, we can experience our holidays as ongoing cycles of reflection and change (teshuvah); we can gain insight into how our faith wanes and waxes like the monthly phases of the moon; we can experience gratitude for creation in the seasonal rhythms of our ancient agricultural celebrations; and most important, we learn to dance between our drive to create and our command to rest with the holy Sabbath's gift.

The Library Committee Needs You

The key to a successful library is collaboration with the greater OZ Community only possible with an active Library Committee, since my time is focused on the Hebrew School, including supervising a student assistant helping with book cataloging. I am in the library two hours per week during Sunday Hebrew School. At home I write this newsletter page, prepare for Sunday Stories and other classes using the library.

A revitalized Library Committee could:

- Meet one evening per month to discuss all the possibilities and organized action steps for the Ohavi Zedek Library and keep minutes of the meetings.
- Support Tikvah 2020 by stimulating the use of the library for all age groups and supporting the goals of the OZ community and its committees.
- Collaborate with other committees on outreach events. For example, in collaboration with the Hebrew School Committee the library successfully promoted a book discussion on The Blessing of a Skinned Knee: Using Jewish Teachings to Raise Self-Reliant Children, by Wendy Mogel. Another time, a discussion on the book There Shall Be No Needy: Pursuing Social Justice Through Jewish Law & Tradition, by Jill Jacobs, was well attended as part of the Social Action Committee

- event to rededicate The Shuk. Collaborating with other committees, I can imagine promoting a book discussion on alternative religious services, a film discussion on Jewish murals or a book signing with a Feen lecturer.
- Develop the book/media collection in line with the interests of the synagogue. As I am focused on developing the collection based on the resource needs of the Hebrew School, Library Committee members could develop the collection to support the interests of the rest of the synagogue, creating a balance of print and electronic resources that would include reference and light and serious works.



public." With spectators lining the streets and the South Burlington High School student body out in force, the ride to the cemetery and the funeral itself were very powerful. Mindy found Burlington's military community, the Jewish community and both the city and state communities caring, supportive and kind.

Since then, she has made a concerted effort to get to know Mark's military compatriots, becoming close friends with many through visits, attending weddings, and Facebook, where she continues to receive news and photos of their families. She describes the connections as "wonderful, but bittersweet." Mark's camouflage suit is displayed in the Vermont Militia Museum near the entrance to Camp Johnson in Colchester, and South Burlington High School has named its press box on the athletic field for him. Moreover, as Mark received military honors and other state and national recognition, Mindy has gotten to meet people in power on both sides of the political aisle, including President and Laura Bush. Having grown up in a different era, she acknowledges that she had no connection to or understanding of the military before Mark enlisted; however, she has come to appreciate the intelligent, caring people who serve, and is a firm believer that "we need to support our troops and become more informed about all aspects of the issues, so that we don't accept glib party lines." She adds that the 'us-and-them' mentality is bad for both civilians and the military, and negatively impacts America. "I have come to think that a two-year compulsory service after high school, military or otherwise, would be helpful in making us better citizens," she says.

Eight months before Mark's death, Shira and her husband Ricky lost their daughter Sarah, after a lifelong illness. Their older daughter Rachel, who was close to Mark in age, is a fashion designer in NYC, and their son Jack is the lead guitarist in the Grammy-winning rock band Fun., best known for the biggest selling song of 2012, "We Are Young." Naomi and Greg's daughter Rebecca works in marketing at a firm in Lambertville, NJ, and their daughter Jacqueline, a stand-up comedian and soon-to-bepublished author, lives in Manhattan. Much to Mindy's delight, their son Jeff, his wife Alison and

children, Mira and Theo, live locally. Jeff is a teacher in South Burlington Middle School, and Alison writes for KidsVt and leads the mentoring program at the Sustainable Academy, formerly the Lawrence Barnes School on North Avenue.

Having said goodbye to their parents – Rabbi Max in 2009 at the age of 93 and Mimi in 2012 at 92 – the sisters remain close. Mindy and Shira have traveled together to the Mediterranean and to Alaska and are planning a trip to South Africa later this year. Last year they joined with Naomi for the First Annual Wall Sisters Weekend Away, a road trip to Philadelphia, where they visited historical sites and museums, shopped, ate wonderful food and "laughed a lot."

Mindy's interests, aside from family and travel, include classical music, regular workouts with a trainer, attending events at the Flynn, and serving as a board member of the Boys and Girls Club. First and foremost, though, are her friendships. And she loves her coed book club - four men and four women, all unrelated, who have been meeting monthly for over 20 years. On her post-retirement list: more time with friends, more travel, classes at UVM, a return to duplicate bridge, and lots more reading.

Acknowledging that Ohavi Zedek is evolving ("it's not the Conservative synagogue I grew up with"), she continues to finds something here that ties her to her past and involves her in its future. Currently she serves on the Board of Directors and on the Cemetery Committee, the Rabbinical Transition Committee, the Volunteer Appreciation Committee and the Human Resources Committee. Since the death of her parents, she has also become a committed minyan maker. "Grieving in community is comforting and helpful," she says.

Mindy admits that she often comes across as cynical, no-nonsense and direct. But she asserts that on the inside she's "mushy and sentimental." When the Wall sisters cleaned out their homestead on North Street, Mindy assembled 500 photos of the interior of the house into an album as a remembrance for the family. And there are memorabilia and photos all over her condo, including an endearing shot of herself as a young mother with full-blown chicken pox. If that's not sentimental, what is?


