FROM THE RABBI



The Mishnah is the first Jewish legal code following the codification of Torah itself. Scholars believe the Mishnah was published orally around 200, around the same time the Haggadah shel Pesah came together. I say published orally because it did not appear at first

in manuscript form but was memorized and recited over and over, creating a foundation for the emerging rabbinical culture that filled the vacuum left by the destruction of the Holy Temple.

There is a passage in the Mishnah (an important one, for it found its way into the traditional siddur) which confounded me for awhile. According to the Mishnah, *Talmud Torah* (the study of sacred texts) is as important as the combination of honoring father and mother, deeds of loving kindness, and making peace between one another. I thought mistakenly that our sages were insulating themselves in private study at the expense of active efforts to make the world a better place.

I really did not understand that the Mishnah was pointing at the depth and breadth of the power of learning; the ways in which the act of learning underlies all of human culture. Indeed, without learning, we human beings could not face the ever-changing world in which we live. Of course, the plain meaning of Talmud Torah is learning from the collected wisdom of the Jewish people over thousands of years, enshrined in Hebrew Scriptures, the Mishnah, the Talmud and the full body of rabbinic literature. There was and continues to be much wisdom to be mined from study of such texts.

Yet I also have come to understand Talmud Torah, in the language of our own time, as life-long learning, the learning in which we human beings need to be engaged in order to fulfill the full potential of our humanity. In this sense, surely, Talmud Torah equals in importance the combination of honoring parents, doing deeds of loving kindness and seeking peace. Indeed, the way of living defined by the fulfillment of these core mitzvot (commandments) is not possible without continuous learning. Always learning provides the energy needed to be fully human.

Here at Ohavi Zedek we are committed to always

learning. Hebrew School is a major component of the synagogue. Just as well, the continued learning of our adult education programs is essential to our living full lives as Jews. I am very grateful to Roz Grossman for reviving these efforts, and to Judy Chalmer who has succeeded Roz, for continuing to bring into our congregation, through the Feen Lecture Series, teachers such as Rabbi Amy Eilberg and James Carroll. (Through the generosity of the family of A. Pearly and Edith Feen, we have had the privilege of hearing from our bimah speakers such as Chief Justice Rehnquist, Chaim Potok, Rabbi Gordon Tucker, Rabbi David Hartman, Rabbi Burt Vizotsky, Rabbi Neil Gillman, amongst others.)

Side by side with these efforts, through the generosity and leadership of Basha Brody, we have revived a Scholar-in-Residence program which each year, early in November, will ensure that our community continues to have the opportunity to learn with leading rabbis of our time. We recently had the privilege to learn with Rabbi Or Rose of Hebrew College. Please consider contacting Basha if you would like to help define next year's event.

In the coming years, my hope and trust is that members of Ohavi Zedek will become ever more conscious of the ways in which life-long learning is not an optional activity but rather the essence of who we are as human beings. The insight that learning is essential to living is at the very heart of Judaism. With the help of God, the courses sponsored by the Adult Education Committee will grow into a communal understanding of the significance of learning to the well being of Ohavi Zedek.

There is an immense storehouse of wisdom amongst the members of our congregation. For years, now, Champlain College's Dr. Robert Mayer has offered history courses which have attracted a good number of OZers. Much thanks to Bob. I hope other members, academics, physicians, attorneys, etc, will bring their learning/teaching to our Adult Ed program, so that its offerings may increase and more and more members will have the opportunity to attend their classes. Talmud Torah at OZ can fuel our respect for our elders, our deeds of loving kindness, and our continuous search for peace amongst ourselves and our neighbors.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Safety and Security

The last six months have been very challenging for the Jewish people, from the war in Gaza to the rise of anti-Semitism around the world. For many of us younger Jews the wave of anti-Semitism circling the globe is unprecedented

in our lifetimes. As attacks against Jews and Jewish institutions increase in the US and abroad we are taking the safety of our people and our congregational home very seriously.

Balancing safety and security with maintaining our sense of being an open and welcoming community is not always easy. While we know that Burlington is not New York City or Boston, and presumably the threat to Ohavi Zedek and Jews in the Burlington area is comparatively lower than in the major population centers, we also cannot afford to ignore the risk that we might be targeted because of our Jewishness. To that end, over the last several years we have taken many steps, both big and small, to improve the safety and security of our congregants and our buildings. In December that included taking the step of installing security cameras in and around OZ. The cameras are designed to monitor the exterior of OZ as well as sensitive points throughout the building. They will act as a deterrent to criminals and vandals and will aid law enforcement should there ever be a threat to people here at OZ (God forbid).

Taking common sense steps like this may not solve all our problems or eliminate all our risks. But no one makes a greater mistake than doing nothing because they can only do a little. We will continue to evaluate safety and security measures at OZ and improve however we can while striving to remain the open and friendly home away from home you all know and love. If you have questions or concerns about our security camera installation or security measures or would like to become more involved with making OZ safer, please contact me directly.

On a happier note, 2014 was an exciting year on many different levels. As the "Numbers Guy" here

I spend a lot of time crunching data. Working on fundraising, budgets, grants and looking at the dollars and cents to keep OZ's finances humming along (and they are!). Tracking how many people attend events and programs (a lot!). Keeping an eye on our membership numbers (growing!). And so on. This year, though, I got a new favorite number: 64,613!

It's not the size of a donation or a budget surplus. It's the amount of carbon dioxide (as of mid-December 2014), 64,613 lbs., that we DIDN'T pump into the atmosphere as a community as a result of our solar panel installation.

In 2014 we spent a lot of energy (of the people variety) looking at how we as a community relate to the environment. We installed a solar array that generates about half of our electricity annually. Thanks to leadership from our b'nai mitzvah students we converted our *ner tamid* to run on solar power and began composting our kitchen scraps. Our new kitchen was built with modern energy efficient appliances across the board, replacing the outdated energy hogs from the old kitchen. The Hebrew School has been piloting zero waste brunches with compostable plates, cups, napkins, etc. And our Scholar-in-Residence weekend focused our community on the deep connection between Jewish values and environmental advocacy and protection.

As an outgrowth of November's Scholar-in-Residence weekend we are forming a Green Team at Ohavi Zedek. The purpose of the Team will be to look both at ways to continue to reduce our OZ community's impact on the environment (as individuals at home and as a Jewish community center at OZ), while also working on broader issues in the larger non-Jewish community. A number of projects are already under consideration or in the works for 2015, including plans to build a rain garden at OZ led by our Young Judaea youth group (see page 14). We hope to achieve much more, but we need your help.

We're looking for passionate, motivated individuals who care about environmental activism and will help us leverage the strength of our community for meaningful change. If this is you, please get in touch with me to join the Green Team.

PROFILE: FRAN POMERANTZ



A year ago, when the Scholarin-Residence Committee decided on Judaism and the Environment as the theme for its November 2014 Shabbaton, Fran Pomerantz jumped in with both feet, volunteering to oversee the purchase and preparation of the vegetarian,

organic, local-as-possible foods for the Friday evening dinner, the Saturday morning kiddush, the snacks after the Saturday evening program, and the Sunday brunch. A daunting task, as she soon discovered! Fran has been a vegetarian for more than four decades. She loves to cook, and her garden at Pomerantz Kasper home in Richmond feeds her family all summer and during the long Vermont winter as well. And although she found that cooking for hundreds is quite different from cooking for family and friends, her efforts made the weekend a culinary success and set the bar high for succeeding SIR programs.

Fran, 58, was not always the 'country girl' she is now: born in Irvington, an industrial town in New Jersey, she grew up in nearby Newark and suburban Maplewood and Short Hills, where her mother and younger sister still reside. Her mom, of Russian descent, was born in America. Jack Pomerantz, her dad, was a native of Radzyn, Poland, born in 1918, the youngest of nine in his family. Having failed to convince his parents and siblings to flee when German planes attacked in 1939, he took off by himself in the middle of the night and made his way to Russia. Twice incarcerated and twice escaped from forced-labor camps in Siberia, he served in the Polish brigade of the Russian army, fighting in eastern Russia, Poland and Germany. His unit liberated the Majdanek concentration camp. There is a copy of his book, Run East: Flight from the Holocaust, in the OZ library.

Two of his brothers and one sister also survived the war. The siblings immigrated to Israel, while Jack found his way to the New York area, working first in a matzo factory in Brooklyn and later in a furniture store in New Jersey. He also worked construction on weekends and eventually achieved the American 6 / January.February 2015 / www.ohavizedek.org

dream as the proprietor of a successful contracting and building company, from which he retired after 45 years. He died in 2000 at the age of 82.

Having attended Milburn High School, Fran went on to American University for two years before transferring to UVM, where she graduated in 1978 with a degree in Botany and Environmental Studies. She'd fallen in love with Vermont, and she stayed on. Her first jobs, while enrolled in graduate classes in the late '70s and early '80s, were as a research lab technician in UVM's Department of Zoology and as a server at the original Ben & Jerry's in the converted gas station across from City Hall Park. It was around this time that her roommate left to get married, and Fran, seeking a new living arrangement in a vegetarian household, was steered toward a place in Hinesburg where four housemates were looking for a fifth. Keith Kasper was among the four.

"We were just housemates and friends for quite a while," Fran says, "but we found that we had a lot in common." Keith, also a native of New Jersey and a UVM graduate, shared Fran's interests in gardening, hiking and camping. They were both committed gardners and vegetarians. And one day, while they were in the house cooking together, something clicked, and their relationship moved to a new level.

Although their housing situation was a good one, Fran's father encouraged her to invest in her own place, and when she found property she liked in Richmond, he and a friend came up one weekend to help construct a 16'x20' cabin. Fran and Keith moved into the cabin, whose amenities included electricity, telephone, an outhouse and storage shed, but no running water.

Married in 1982, Fran held a job at 4Seasons and Keith worked at Siteworks building stone walls. After injuring his back, he decided to alter his career trajectory. He applied to law schools and was accepted at Rutgers in Camden, NJ. He and Fran relocated for the three-year duration of his schooling, and she worked as the manager of a garden center. Editor-in chief of the Rutgers Law Journal as a student, Keith graduated with honors in 1987 and received several job offers in New Jersey. "My parents were pressuring us to stay there,"

Fran says, "but we were committed to returning to Vermont."

Pregnant with their first child when they moved back, she and Keith set to work overseeing and involving themselves in the construction of a bigger home on the 20-acre property. Fran served as general contractor, and they both worked on insulating and painting. "Alex was born in February, 1988, right after we moved into the house," Fran says, recalling with a shiver that cold winter (and that outhouse) nearly twenty-seven years ago. Shaina, born in 1990, Hannah in 1994, their dog Rusty and six chickens complete the family.

The house stands tall at the end of a long pebbled driveway, surrounded by woods and dirt trails, and offering spectacular mountain views in every direction. There is a 100 x100 ft garden with fruit trees and flowers. "We grow more food than we can use," says Fran. "Our neighbors come over to pick, and I put up a lot of food in canning jars. We have a full freezer." Indoors, a wood fireplace heats the cozy kitchen, dining and living space, and a workspace with a couple of looms where Fran weaves beautiful blankets, wall hangings and other items she gives as gifts. Using silk thread, she has woven a *tallit* for each of her kids for their bar/bat mitzvah.

All three of the Pomerantz Kasper kids attended elementary and middle school in Richmond, Ohavi Zedek Hebrew School and Mount Mansfield High School. They all ski; Alex and Shaina are into fencing and were competitive fencers throughout their college careers. Shaina also played lacrosse and was a cross-country runner, and Hannah did crosscountry and theater. Alex went on to Brandeis and to the American University in Cairo, Egypt. He is currently working as a media news analyst for a communications firm in DC. Shaina spent her senior year of high school and an additional year at the United World College-USA in Montezuma, New Mexico, before attending Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota. She is employed in Montpelier as a community organizer with the Toxics Action Center, a group that works to reduce environmental pollution that is a threat to health. Hannah followed in Shaina's footsteps at MMU and at UWC. She is enrolled in the nursing program at UPenn.

Keith's first job in Vermont was as law clerk for Judge Ernest W. Gibson in the Vermont Supreme Court. Shortly after that he joined a Burlington firm, now named McCormick, Fitzpatrick, Kasper & Burchard, with a focus on defending employers in workplace injury litigation. He is now Managing Partner of the firm. Fran has worked part-time through the years doing home sewing and as a gardener and a garden designer. More recently, in addition to weaving and gardening, she serves as a substitute teacher in the Chittenden East School district.

For many years the Pomerantz Kaspers enjoyed summer vacations with Fran's parents at the Jersey shore; now they meet with family in Kennebunkport, Maine. They also like camping trips and have camped here and out West. Not surprisingly, there have been several trips to Israel, once with just Hannah and Fran's parents to a cousin's wedding, and once with the entire family several weeks. (It was on her first trip there, at the age of 15, when Fran discovered that, contrary to her mother's insistence that meat is absolutely essential to a healthy diet, one could live healthily and happily as a vegetarian!) Tragically, one of her cousins, 20-year-old Daniel Pomerantz, a sergeant in the Golani Brigade, was killed in the recent battle in Gaza. Fran is a close observer of the situation in Israel, and her hopes for peace include the possibility that a two-state solution can still be reached.

Although they came from different religious backgrounds, Fran and Keith made the decision to maintain a Jewish household. It was when Alex was a toddler in a playgroup with other new moms and kids that Fran began to feel the loneliness of being one of few Jews in Richmond. "I wanted to reach out to other Jewish families, for myself and for our kids," she recalls. She and Keith investigated several synagogues, including 'pre-Joshua' Ohavi Zedek, Temple Sinai and Beth Jacob in Montpelier, before finding their spiritual home back at OZ in the early '90s. The open and welcoming environment has strengthened the relationship over the years. "Rabbi Josh will always be my rabbi," Fran says.

RABBINICAL SUCCESSION



On December 7, at the Congregational Meeting, I updated everyone about the status of our rabbinic search.

Last year, we surveyed each congregant by phone, written survey and meetings to discern the rabbinic qualities,

knowledge and experience that are most important to you. The Rabbinic Search committee took that information and developed criteria for our next rabbi. This information, as well as details about our next steps, a timeline and more will be available on our website in the near future. If you do not have access to the internet, copies will be available in the office, or let us know if you would like a copy mailed to your home.

We are currently reviewing resumes. We have received seven applications thus far, and have culled that group down to to three viable candidates whom we will interview via Skype.

At this time we await additional candidates. The United Synagogue Rabbinic Assembly Placement Office has assured me that "the low number of applicants is perfectly normal at this point, as we are still early in the process and should soon see a substantially larger flow of candidates."

As you may have heard, Rabbi Jan has withdrawn her application for candidacy for the Senior Rabbi position. Her current contract expires on June 30, and negotiations for her next contract as Assistant Rabbi are beginning soon.

At our last meeting, we discussed procedures, questions and committee member roles for the first series of Skype interviews that will take place in the next week or two.

Be sure to come on **February 19** for a fascinating presentation by **Paul Growald**, a dedicated pollinator



Please treat yourself to this wonderful book by Vermont author Leda Schubert, beautiful illustrated by Gerard DuBois.

Booklist review from Amazon.com:

This handsome picture book tells the story of Marcel Marceau, the maestro of mime. Born in France, he was 16 when WWII broke out and shifted his life. He changed his last name to hide his Jewish identity and worked with the French underground. After the war, he studied



mime and created his signature character, Bip. Quotes from Marceau connect the silence of those who returned from concentration camps (where his father had died) with his own choice of silence on stage. Schubert distills his complex life story into a short, pithy text that reads aloud well. While she discusses his art and his worldwide fame, a series of images bring Marceau's movements and emotions to life on the page. Well thought out and varied in composition, DuBois' paintings illustrate the text literally while expanding it visually and emotionally, particularly in the haunting sequence of narrative scenes during the war. An afterword offers a somewhat more detailed account of Marceau's life and suggests activities for children who would like to try mime. Even readers with an unfavorable view of mime as a medium will find plenty to admire in this picture-book biography of the man behind the whiteface makeup. Grades 2-4. ~ Carolyn Phelan

WHY ISRAEL OR JEWISH SUMMER CAMP?

What's better than the activities, friendships, and communal life of traditional camps? At Jewish summer camps, Jewish values, role models, culture, traditions and heritage help campers connect to their own identity and the larger Jewish community. Jewish summer camp, or Israel programs, lay the groundwork for strong Jewish communities and can be a critical element in a young person's education. As an added benefit, Jewish summer camps are fun!

How do I pay for these programs?

There are many scholarships available locally. Do not assume you don't qualify. We don't want cost to be the reason you don't go to camp or Israel. A camp scholarship application for local scholarships is available at www.ohavizedek.org/campscholarships. Additionally, if your child has never been to Jewish camp, the Foundation for Jewish Camps (FJC), One Happy Camper Program offers need-blind grants of \$1,000 to first time campers. Learn more at http://www.jewishcamp.org/one-happy-camper/. Additionally, BunkConnect is open to campers attending nonprofit Jewish overnight camps for the first time whose families meet income criteria. http:// www.jewishcamp.org/one-happy-camper-2. are other need based scholarships for many camp and Israel programs.

CAMP

There are many options for Jewish summer camp. Here are a few examples: For a local Vermont Jewish summer camp experience Roots and Trails offers two Eco-Jewish camp options for girls: Tiferet Trails Wilderness Camp for girls aged 11-14 and Women Within the Wild for ages 14 and up. The students benefitted from learning about the Shuk and realizing that it is a part of Ohavi Zedek. One student expressed it proudly, "this is our store." When asked who shops at the Shuk, another said, "the people who shop here are all people--some people who need good prices and some people who like to shop at thrift stores, like my family." We want to continue this partnership in the years to come. Thank you, Naomi, and all of the students and teachers at Ohavi Zedek Hebrew School.

Recently, we added Women Helping Battered Women to the list of those helped by the Shuk. We now donate cell phones and vouchers to them. The phones can be used to make 911 calls even when they cannot be used to dial any other number. Regarding the vouchers, WHBW staff asked "what if the woman has children?" We explained that each person in the family could have a voucher, for as many children as there are. This response was greeted with a wide smile.

Another smile came from a gentleman who shared that he had bought his two-year-old granddaughter a pair of jeans with hearts on the back pocket at the Shuk and "she loves them so much she

won't take them off." And then there was the lady who told my granddaughters that she shops at the Shuk because it allows her to buy treasures, like the Irish scarf she just purchased. She so appreciates being able to afford the treasures she finds in the Shuk.

These days, I am downsizing and cleaning out items I've had in my home for years. My children don't want most of my stuff, as they have their own. It is easier to part with something when I see someone else is taking it home to cherish and make it a part of their lives. If you have such items, we would very much appreciate your donating them to the Shuk. If you have holiday gifts to recycle, we would appreciate your giving them to the Shuk. And we still need sweaters, winter coats, boots, gloves and mittens. We can promise you that your Shalom Shuk will find a good home for all your donations.
