

FROM THE RABBI



Each summer for the past eight years I have studied at the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem. The Machon ("Institute," as we call it) has become my home for continued rabbinic learning and deepening connections with Israel. Founded

by the philosopher Rabbi David Hartman (of blessed memory), the Machon is a center for pluralistic learning for rabbis, educators, scholars, lay leaders, Israeli leaders, and North American Christian and Muslim leaders, among others. Here rabbis from around the world (though mostly North America) and the Jewish ideological map share intensive learning. We gather for deep discussion of contemporary Jewish and world issues informed by Jewish texts, taught by the finest scholars in various disciplines of Jewish learning, and by Israeli cultural and political luminaries.

Hartman offers intellectual rigor and honest confrontation with our most vexing concerns. For Rabbi David Hartman (z'l), the two-week July Rabbinic Torah Seminar (RTS), was the crown jewel of the Machon. Now, his son Rabbi Donniel Hartman, an influential scholar and leader, is the President of the Machon.

Days at RTS begin in the Beit Midrash (study hall) at 8:30 am. Later, after a brief afternoon break, we continue until 9:30 at night. While wrestling over texts and ideas, we expand our collegial networks. Many of us form friendships with Israelis, who often become our dearest friends.

From 2010 through 2013 I had the privilege to participate in Hartman's Rabbinic Leadership Initiative (RLI), which brought us to the Machon for an extended program through July and a week of learning in January. During three academic years we enjoyed weekly online learning with Hartman scholars. When we graduated as "Senior Rabbinic Fellows" in 2013, our cohort had grown a lot as individuals and as a group.

The program which David Hartman (z'l) founded 40 years ago now attracts nearly 200 rabbis, many of whom return annually or often. I was very grateful for OZ's support of my study at the Machon this year. All aspects of my rabbinic work are enriched and even transformed by my learning at Hartman. I will spend the year ahead unpacking it with all of you.

Here are few RTS 2016 highlights, though there is much more:

- Yizhar Hess, Executive of the Masorati (Conservative) movement in Israel, presented on "The State of the Kotel Agreement." The next day most of us joined Women of the Wall for Rosh Hodesh at the Kotel and then Reform-Masorati-led egalitarian prayer in the Kotel plaza.
- Tal Becker, a chief negotiator for Israel with the Palestinians taught, "Israel and the Middle East; Where do we go from here?" He said, "One of the big disconnects between American and Israeli Jews is that Jews in America are a tiny minority that sees itself and behaves like a majority. And Jews in Israel are a majority who see themselves and behave like a minority. There is a deep sense of vulnerability. In the regional picture, they must then focus on prevention rather than resolution."
- Micah Goodman taught, "The Philosophy of Jewish Time as a Core Feature of Jewish Identity." "Nature does not control us as it was experienced in the ancient world. Technology is doing what theology used to do for us: control. We live in an age of abundance where (quoting David Brooks), empathy is down 40%, and narcissism is up 20 % in last 30 years. We try to capture every moment we experience and then share it and then feel anxiety about the feedback. We created technology to control nature but it is controlling us and shaping and changing us. Judaism has to be radical now to liberate us from the technology that we created."

Another highlight is the opportunity for many informal discussions among colleagues. As I was asked about my community in Burlington, I shared some of the challenges we at OZ faced this past year, and I was reminded that we are not alone. Most of my colleagues had various challenges that paralleled ours. In these conversations I was reminded how strong and wonderful a community we have at Ohavi Zedek. We are building a great future together.

Now we begin again with the upcoming Jewish year, filled with possibilities for enrichment and meaningful Jewish experiences. I hope that you have had an enjoyable summer. I look forward to hearing your stories, and continuing the conversation.

FROM THE PRESIDENT



None of us wants to think about our own death or that of our family members or friends. None of us wants to think about being ill or hurt, and what we will need, if and when that time comes.

I hope that for each of us at Ohavi Zedek, that time is a long time away. If I had my way, it would never come.

When you are a member of Ohavi Zedek, your dues are not an act of *tzedakah*. You are not making a charitable contribution when you pay your dues.

Many of you have pledged and some have already paid your dues. For that I thank you. For those of you who have not yet pledged or paid, I urge you to do so.

Ohavi Zedek relies a great deal on our dues. Please pay your fair share. That is how we operate. Our dues are based on your integrity. For me, integrity is everything.

You get many things in return for what you pay that those Jews in the community who are not members do not receive.

Much of what we get is intangible, such as the opportunity to observe our religious tradition, our festivals, our holidays and Shabbat in a variety of ways with other Jews.

At Ohavi Zedek we try very hard to provide a minyan for members every single day. We succeed much more often than we fail.

Our synagogue is a place where relationships with other Jewish families are formed and maintained, sometimes for decades. Some friendships are new. Others span a lifetime.

Members can share experiences with others who are their own age and in similar situations, while at the same time, observe, interact with and learn from those of different ages, sexual orientation and gender.

We are a Jewish community where children gather and thrive, whether it be in Hebrew School, or at events that are especially designed for them.

We are a Jewish center for activities.

Our Adult Education programs are superb. Our

events are stimulating and relevant. Some are just fun. Others reflect a social action or Jewish cultural focus.

The annual trip to Montreal for a performance of the Yiddish Theatre is one example.

Another example is an event that we hosted at OZ on August 8 for **Kids4Peace**, an organization that brings Israeli Jewish, Christian and Palestinian teenagers to the United States. They were in our country for two weeks of activities and communication with one another, and with American adults and youth. We at OZ sponsored an ice cream social with ice cream donated by Ben and Jerry's and served by their cofounder, Jerry Greenfield. Also attending were the Deputy Counsel General of Israel and staff members from the Boston Consulate. We were treated with a performance by the Muslim Girls for Change. For many of us, their poetry was a window into the experience of being a Muslim American female teenager that we had not heard about before. This event raised the social awareness of those who attended. It was also fun. (See photos on page 16.)

Our Shalom Shuk is a manifestation of the Jewish heart and soul. The Shuk exists on what it takes in from you and from others. It flourishes through what it gives to our community, not only to those of us who are members, but to the greater Burlington community as well, especially to our newest Americans.

If you are a member of Ohavi Zedek, you get to know that the Shalom Shuk exists and does good work because of OZ and members like you.

When you are a member you have the opportunity to give as well as to receive.

Our committees are active and productive. It takes many hands doing many things to make a community and that is what Ohavi Zedek is. We are a rich, vibrant and welcoming Jewish community. Our Judaism, in whatever way each of us defines it, is vital and alive. If that is not your experience, go deeper and immerse yourself in all of what your fellow members have to offer.

Whether you volunteer to cook in the kitchen, usher at High Holy Days, serve on a committee, paint faces at the Chanukah party or serve on the Board of Directors, you receive by what you give.

What you also get as a member at OZ is that your fellow members, our clergy and our staff, are present for you when you need us to be, as best as we can.

A relationship with a rabbi and a cantor (I am personally committed to our having a cantor next year) is priceless, and it is one of the privileges of being a member.

Whether it be for a question about Jewish tradition, history, or spirituality, Rabbi Amy is available with answers or just to sit with you and with the questions themselves.

We never know when we need pastoral care or a visit by a member of our *G'mach* Committee.

The celebration of joyful life cycle events, weddings, baby naming and Briot, and yes, the not so joyful ones, family crises, funerals, shiva and others, are enhanced by the facilitation of clergy.

All of this and more is what you receive when you are a member of our Synagogue.

It is my perception and experience that every day we are making headway and progress regarding some of the challenges that we have faced in this last year. I am optimistic about the future of Ohavi Zedek and I want you, our members, to share my enthusiasm for what we do and for who we are as a Jewish community.

That brings me back to where I started. Last year

our Board of Directors passed a new policy regarding our cemeteries, and the purchase of gravesites that will go into effect on November 1, 2017. There are also changes being proposed to the board regarding fees for members and for non-members, regarding rabbinical and building fees.

The policies that have already been adopted will pertain to both of our cemeteries, one located on Patchen Road, South Burlington and one on North Avenue, Burlington. Fees will go up at that time in order to keep up with the rising costs of maintaining our cemeteries as befitting those who lie there. Between now and then, all members are eligible to purchase graves at the rates that have remained the same for many years. If you plan for yourself and/or family members to be buried in one of the Ohavi Zedek cemeteries, now is the time to purchase your plots. If you are a member now or even after the date of the change, your fees will be less than those for non-members.

Recently I purchased my own plot. I do not intend to utilize it until I have run out of all other available options. Seriously, I hope to live for a long time, and do not feel at all gloomy or depressed about knowing where I will one day be buried. Actually, I feel a sense of comfort about it. I will be in very good company.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Writing this introduction to the Ohavi Zedek community, I am filled with excited anticipation, knowing that someday soon I will know many of you well. Soon we will not be strangers; I will have heard your stories, served alongside you on committees, sung next to you in services, shared challah

with you around Shabbat tables. When I came to OZ to visit, your close-knit, vibrant community touched me deeply. I saw your clear commitment to fostering a welcoming atmosphere where inclusion and diversity are honored. That brief visit made me want to learn more about your community, and made me feel sure that OZ is the place I want to work, serve, and build my spiritual home.

I come to Ohavi Zedek having spent the last several years working at the intersection of Jewish community and justice. For the past two years I have been directing an array of educational programs at a lively synagogue in Northampton, MA, Congregation B'nai Israel. There I explored new, invigorating ways to make Judaism and the synagogue relevant in the lives of teens and young adults. In addition to text-based learning, services, and classes, we created an educational farm and outdoor classroom, Abundance Farm. On the farm, adjacent to the synagogue, children, teens, and adults worked, played, prayed, grew food for the Northampton Survival Center, and explored the connection between Judaism, justice, and the earth.

At Congregation B'nai Israel and Abundance Farm, I loved helping to support a spiritual home for people coming to Judaism from many different backgrounds, home practices, and relationships to tradition. This fertile diversity created interesting conversation, and led to many kinds of prayer, program, and play. I sense this rich ground abounds at OZ as well.

In addition to my work at CBI, I founded and directed an educational, land-based organization, Dig In Farm, while living here in the Pioneer Valley. Dig In Farm serves as a place for young people to do hands-on, experiential learning, build community, and gain skills as social change-makers. We ran a variety of programs

that included internships for college students, residential summer programs for young women, and shorter workshops for people of all ages. All of the courses at Dig In explored the intersection of social and environmental justice. This work felt inextricably linked to my identity as a Jew and commitment to *tikkun olam* and serving as *shomeret adamah*. Burlington certainly seems a perfect place to continue deepening these passions, and I am thrilled that the OZ community is already richly engaged with the work of *tikkun olam*.

Recently I have been working on one other major project; in December my husband Jacob and I welcomed our first baby, Amos. I expect Jacob and Amos will be roaming around OZ quite often, so if you see a lightning-fast crawler with a papa sprinting after him, you'll know who it is. We are so excited to have such a warm, welcoming community in which to raise our little one.

We as a family are most drawn to Ohavi Zedek because of your commitment to not only accepting but celebrating a diverse membership. Raised a Quaker in Georgia, I majored in Religious Studies at Yale University and later converted to Judaism after several years of study and partnership with Jacob, an observant Jew. I appreciate the dynamism and synergy that happens when people come together from different religious frameworks. We stand at a moment in Jewish life when we must navigate new terrain in order to create a meaningful Judaism for people who increasingly identify as "just Jewish" rather than with any one particular denomination. People are hungry for meaningful spiritual practice and community, while they also increasingly reject rigid denominational lines.

OZ's forward-thinking inclusivity and Conservative celebration of both tradition and modernity have clearly combined to energize your community and make OZ the hub of Jewish life in Vermont. I am honored and delighted to join you, and look forward to learning, working, praying, eating, singing, mourning, laughing, and growing with you all.

PROFILE: JEFF PRIEST & NAZLY GUZMAN



As soon as I met Jeff Priest and his wife Nazly I put their names on my list to interview for a profile. I mean, how often do you find a Priest who's a member of a synagogue? But Jeff himself went one better when he revealed that after college he briefly considered studying for

the rabbinate. "Rabbi Priest," he mused. How cool is that?

But the Yale graduate with a degree in psychology decided to focus on educational research for children with disabilities, particularly preschoolers, and over the following decades held jobs in Washington DC, Connecticut and Minnesota (where he earned a Ph.D. in educational psychology and remained for ten years) before going on to Arizona and New Hampshire. Eventually, he returned to his home state of Rhode Island.

Jeff was born in Providence in August, 1961. His father, a retired CPA, and younger sister still live there; his mother passed away seven years ago. Jeff's forebears on both sides came from Eastern Europe and settled in Boston, where his parents met. His paternal grandparents arrived on these shores in the late 1800s, and his maternal grandparents and great-grandparents came shortly after the turn of the century. Jeff has fond memories of his great-grandparents, who died when he was about 14. The family always belonged to a Conservative shul.

He has no knowledge of the origin of his surname, however. He opines that some miscommunication might have taken place when the family immigrated. [You may have heard the apocryphal tale of the Jewish immigrant at Ellis Island who, when asked for his name in English stammered, "Ich fargessen" (Yiddish for "I forgot"). His name in the New World: Ike Ferguson.] On the other hand, Jeff acknowledges, he is a kohen, a descendant of the Israelite priests who performed the sacrificial rites and conducted services in the sanctuary in biblical times. By a strange coincidence, Nazly reveals that, following Latin America's tradition of honoring both parents by using both surnames, her full name is Nazly Guzman Pastor.

Nazly was born in Colombia, South America in

1972. When she was 12 she moved with her parents, older brother and younger sister to Rhode Island to join her dad's large extended clan. "The Guzmans singlehandedly increased the population of Rhode Island by 30%," Jeff quips, and he admits that he still has trouble remembering everyone's names.

Pursuing her interest in international studies at Boston College, Nazly graduated in 1994 with a degree in political science with a concentration in Latin American studies. She then came to Vermont to join AmeriCorps, an organization often called the 'domestic Peace Corps,' whose members engage in public service to help others and meet critical needs in the community. She lived here for four years before leaving for graduate school at the University of Arizona. "I went from living 45 minutes from the Canadian border to living 45 minutes from the Mexican border," she notes.

Following a stint in the mid-West, Nazly returned to New England, first to Connecticut and then to her native Rhode Island, where she worked as director of the AmeriCorps program at Ready to Learn Providence, an agency that promotes "best practices" for children and their families in early childhood education. She had been there two years when Jeff Priest was hired in 2007. After six or seven months Jeff worked up the nerve to ask Nazly to a symphony concert. They dated for three years.

In 2011 he and Nazly planned a small, informal wedding at Acadia National Park in Maine, with their immediate family in attendance. The view from a mountaintop in Acadia is breathtaking, Jeff says, although heavy fog rolled in on their special day. Inclement weather notwithstanding, the family delighted in the ceremony and their three-day getaway, with horse-drawn carriage rides and tours of the seaside town of Bar Harbor.

While they were dating, Jeff and Nazly often vacationed in Vermont and talked about relocating here, and on a sub-zero day in early January 2013 they cut their ties in Providence and made their move into a rental apartment in Burlington. More recently, they bought a home in South Burlington and, after Nazly completed a class in landscaping, embarked on their first attempt at gardening. Somewhat in awe she exclaims, "Everything's blooming now!"

LUNCH & LEARN

Nazly found work with the Washington County Youth Service Bureau in Montpelier in their Youth Development Program (YDP) that focuses on youth both in and about to get out of foster care. The goal of the program is to help young people transition from State custody to self-sufficiency and independent living. "The job was challenging," Nazly says. "I was there for more than two years." Currently she works in the Vermont Department of Health's immunization program, which seeks to protect children and adults by providing free vaccines. "My office is in Burlington on Cherry Street," she says with a smile, happy to have substantially shortened her daily commute.

Jeff is employed in the Medical Biostatistics Unit in the College of Medicine at the University of Vermont. Biostatisticians assist medical researchers with everything from project design to data analysis and writing manuscripts. While Nazly drives to work, he pedals his bike to his office in the Hills Building on the UVM campus.

After easing into the local Jewish community by attending a Passover seder at OZ, Jeff and Nazly joined the synagogue and became members of the Wednesday evening minyan group, to which they've been faithful for over two years. An informal meeting with Rabbi Joshua in 2014 led to formal conversion classes for Nazly, a process that lasted nine months and culminated in a conversion ceremony on the shores of Lake Champlain and a special Kiddush at the synagogue last July.

As a couple, Jeff and Nazly have no doubt that they made the right decision in coming to Vermont. "We love it here," they say in unison. They attended a Meet and Greet with Rabbi Amy and were impressed by her enthusiasm and positive outlook. As they continue to settle in to their surroundings, they hope to become more active and involved in their new community.

FROM THE TREASURER



Shalom chaverim (members/friends),

Yup, I'm still Treasurer. I had decided to step down from the position in June due to the time requirements. In the interim, Bill Miller volunteered to be co-Treasurer, a manageable

arrangement for both of us, at least for now. I am thrilled to be working with him. Bill, the CFO at Green Lantern Development, has been Treasurer of many organizations, and has already jumped into the work. We have a very ambitious agenda for the upcoming months. Our main work continues to be putting financial controls in place, and working toward a balanced budget by cutting costs and increasing revenue.

And speaking of revenue, we want to be sure you understand the different options for your donations (those above and beyond membership pledges). The last issue of *The Voice* contained a list of Endowment and additional funds. The funds listed were the ones that have been donated to in recent years. A more complete list of our funds, and what they are used for, follows.

But first, in case you don't already know, here is the difference between an Endowment Fund and a "Special" Fund. Endowment Funds allow the use of the interest on the fund only, and not the principal, unless explicitly stated otherwise. The goal is to maintain the principal in perpetuity, passing on the money to future generations. At OZ the board votes to use a certain percentage of these funds each year, with the intention of maintaining the principal. The percentage is generally between 2 and 5%. This year it is 4%. The principal is invested at our brokerage, Raymond James. The advantage of donating to Endowment Funds is that the money will hopefully be there for many generations to come. The disadvantage is that the money is not immediately available.

Special Funds are not endowment and are for immediate use. You are welcome to donate generously to any or all!

FERN HILL UPDATE

Fern Hill is the housing complex just north of Ohavi Zedek Synagogue. You may have parked on the grounds during High Holy Day services.

To give you a brief introduction, the Synagogue Corporation is a 501(c)(3) corporation that owns Fern Hill. The Synagogue Corporation Board of Directors is composed of Ohavi Zedek members who have been approved by the OZ Board of Directors. The rabbi is an ex-officio voting member of the Synagogue Corporation Board.

Fern Hill grew out of the vision of the late Rabbi Wall and the OZ congregation during the 1970s that high quality affordable housing was needed for the elderly and for individuals with disabilities. To that end, the Synagogue Corporation was created, and then Ohavi Zedek deeded the land upon which Fern Hill stands at 214 North Prospect Street to the Synagogue Corporation during 1979.

The monies for the construction of Fern Hill came through the Section 202 Program from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The residents' rent was and is subsidized through the Section 8 program. Fern Hill opened its doors in 1980.

Fern Hill continues to provide affordable housing to sixty low-income households comprising the elderly or individuals with disabilities. Fern Hill is a community. Services are provided. There is a residents' association.

A more comprehensive description of Fern Hill, including history, description of the residents and building and the relationship with HUD, can be found in the material that was distributed at the Congregational Meeting in June. A copy of "What is Fern Hill?" can be found on the Ohavi Zedek website. We hope you will read the materials on the website. We thank OZ for the opportunity to make this information available to the congregation.

The Synagogue Corporation remains committed to the purpose set out in its Articles of Incorporation to continue Fern Hill as affordable housing for low-income elderly and for individuals with disabilities. The Synagogue Corporation is looking at the future needs of the residents and how to best meet those needs and looking into how to best maintain and improve the property.

SHALOM SHUK HAPPENINGS



What does it take to run the Ohavi Zedek Thrift Shop, Shalom Shuk? As in the questions at our

Passover Seder, we have many answers. Here are some:

From the beginning it has taken the strong will of a number of women, though it is Sarah Bloomenthal whose name stands out as the strongest. Sarah ran the Rummage Room, as it was initially called. Sarah had volunteers who came to support her efforts, among them Becky Dessell and Shirley Rutstein, who was concerned that Sarah was doing too much when she trudged through the deep snow in response to a call from the rabbi to help someone in need.

To move from a Rummage Room to the Shalom Shuk, Kathy Chasan and Sisterhood joined the Social Action Committee, led by Jeff Potash, to put together the funds to renovate our barn. Many volunteers involved in the renovation included new immigrants taking English courses in OZ classrooms. Note: all of the money for the renovations were paid by the Shuk income.

Currently, it is Raul Guevara who oversees the building and grounds. Raul has been at the Shuk through thick and thin: shoveling snow, putting new locks on doors, installing and taking out the window air conditioner, assuring the building is cleaned regularly, finding the underground electric wire tunnel from the synagogue to the barn which may be used in the future to hook up a telephone and computer line... Raul's most recent help came this August when he rid the building of two beehives outside and a woodchuck in the walls. Thank you, Raul.

Tari Cote is the manager of the Shuk's very attractive Facebook Page. Tari takes the pictures and keeps the page up to date. One day, upon seeing the new page come up, a customer left her cup of hot coffee at breakfast to run to the Shuk to buy an item!

What does it actually take to run the shop? Dan Vaux, Aviva Gottesman and Karen Robair, Shuk employees, may tell you: liking people, understanding fashion, keeping the shop attractive and organized, being aware of items of value, such as pictures, books, crystal, jewelry, and rugs. It also means five to six hours standing on a concrete floor sorting through donations. And most important: doing all with a positive attitude and a smile.

Frequently, our employees go beyond their expected duties. This happened recently when late one afternoon a young couple stopped in the Shuk for some basic household items. In talking with them Shuk staff learned they were traveling nurses who had arrived in Burlington just two days earlier from Australia. They had an apartment, but not much else. They found some dishes at the Shuk but still needed most everything else. Our staff suggested some places for other household needs and furniture, including a bed and linens that were being given away. They were able to find nearly everything they needed and came back the next day, very happy and grateful for the help and suggestions they received at the Shuk.

What a joy to have the Shalom Shuk in Ohavi Zedek! Come on over, 11:00 am to 4:00 pm Sunday through Friday, browse and shop or drop off donations and share the joy with us. In the nex issue of *The Voice*, the Shuk article will focus on the source of donations.
