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# FROM THE RABBI



Lessons Learned and the Map Forward

This has been an interesting Jewish year at Ohavi Zedek. With interim plans for cantorial services in place, we enjoyed a year of praying, singing and learning with Kochava Krieger and Cantor Heather Batchelor.

Kochava davened beautifully on the High Holy Days and for some b'nai mitzvah services. Throughout the year Kochava was our b'nai mitzvah tutor, using technology to work with our kids, guiding each of them to be confidently prepared. Cantor Heather joined us for the other holidays and b'nai mitzvah services, bringing the joy of song and uplifting chazzanut (prayerful singing) to our community. Along with her husband Steve and son Benny, who became part of our community, Cantor Heather enhanced the joy of tradition at many significant moments.

We were blessed to find such great support during this interim year. Kochava and Cantor Heather were gifts to us. But we knew that this arrangement was a temporary solution for our greater need for a full-time, in-residence professional cantor. A full-time cantor can serve the needs of our diverse, active community as a teacher, service leader, spiritual resource, pastoral caregiver and clergy partner with me. So we embarked on the search for a full-time cantor during the winter placement season.

Our Cantor Search Committee, ably led by Marv Greenberg, spent many hours preparing our placement listing to articulate our needs and describe our community. They poured over a stack of resumes, listened to candidate recordings and discussed every application at length. Upon selecting suitable potential candidates, several Skype interviews were conducted, followed by in-person interviews with three promising candidates. Many of you came to hear the candidates and to weigh in. You know the outcome by now—only one candidate was considered the right fit for our community. That candidate wrestled for days over his choice, with much interest in our community, but he ultimately felt that a New York City position was better for his personal needs at this time. We understood, but were very disappointed.

We will soon announce a new interim plan. Next year, 5778, will be a new year of opportunity for us, as we continue to strengthen the ways we service our community.

I was warmed and encouraged by the hard-working, intelligent and open-hearted work of our volunteers during

this process. To the members of the search committee: You guys are awesome! Thank you for all you have done for us!

Let's realize that this was one chapter in our pursuit of the right cantor for our community. That we didn't conclude this search with a match does not mean that we failed. We did very well. I am gratified that we avoided any impulse to go with a candidate who would be just "good enough"--not quite right for our needs. With patience, the right cantor has yet to find us and be found. It just takes time.

We can be proud that this was a values-clarification process. Music, song, learning, and traditional and innovative worship are all important to us. We realized how important it is for us, as a Conservative synagogue, to be engaged in "tradition and change." We value the beauty of traditional prayer and melody while yearning for contemporary Jewish spiritual experiences, such as contemporary chants, new melodies and camp-style sing-alongs. This is how we remain vibrant and engaging. We need a cantor who will artfully bridge tradition and innovation to serve our diversity. We aspire to be a strong "sacred community committed to a dynamic Judaism that is learned and passionate, authentic and pluralistic, joyful and accessible, egalitarian and traditional."\* This is our path and our destination.

Thank you all for your input, your patience, and your voices. We are moving on to the next chapter together!

# FROM THE PRESIDENT



When I started writing there was snow on the ground, when I revisited this message it was raining heavily, and now as I finish I see high temperatures of 75F in the forecast. Lots of changes and unknowns, but here in Vermont we're always excited to 'see' Spring even, though the calendar says it is already here!

There is always a bit of uncertainty as to when we will see the grass turn green and hear the songs of the returning birds, but we trust in the process and await the rewards. This transformation is wonderful, and in so many ways mirrors what is happening at OZ.

The board has been very busy with the budget process, painstakingly looking over the facts and figures and making difficult decisions. We are realistic: we know there are challenges but we remain excited about the many activities that are now in place or to be started. Grace Oedel, Bill Miller, and our entire Finance Committee have worked diligently and we are making great strides in streamlining the budget process. This past December the new board committed to building transparency into what we do. That is now part of what guides us, and we have already seen results with the external controls we have put in place with Kesef Accounting Services. The amount of work that Bill has put in as Treasurer and Chair of the Finance Committee is staggering. We are so fortunate to have him in these roles! He stepped into a very delicate situation and has quietly and efficiently led us to a much better and stronger place. Thank you, Bill and Grace, for teaming up to make so many positive changes in this area. I also wish to thank Mary Greenberg, who has stepped down from the board. His service as board member and Secretary was incredibly helpful to OZ and greatly appreciated.

At the Congregational Meeting on June 11 we have a lot of information to cover. We will discuss the budget, how we are addressing the deficit and our financial planning for the future. We'll also highlight new initiatives and some of the great work underway to create growth. I recently launched an exercise with the board and committee chairs that I'm calling 'pause and reflect.' I've asked everyone to pause and reflect on the work of the past six months and how we are addressing important issues, such as growth of the synagogue, creating different entry points, and setting in place a strong foundation so we can move forward. Please let me know about anything that comes to mind when you

pause and reflect. A summary of the information will be shared at the meeting on June 11.

Recently we underwent an exhaustive and disappointing search for a cantor. The excellent candidate to whom we offered the job ultimately decided against moving to Vermont. Many thanks to the Cantor Search Committee and its chair, Marv Greenberg. It was great to hear the many positive, truly heartfelt things the candidates had to say about their visit to OZ. We have a very special community here with so much potential because we are forward-thinking and recognize the importance of creating opportunities, while at the same time trying to balance financial obligations. We will begin the fiscal year with a full-time cantorial intern, a wonderful opportunity for OZ, and then in the Fall we'll begin the cantor search process once again.

I've asked Wayne Senville to chair a subcommittee that will focus on our Fair Share system of dues collection. This effort is in the beginning stages of what is a delicate and overdue review of how we have handled Fair Share. Has it been successful? Do we have the data to support our assumptions? These are just a couple of the many questions to be asked. Last year I worked with a member of a group called Partners for Change who were working with United Synagogue for Conservative Judaism (USCJ) to examine the Fair Share option and its impact on synagogue finances. It is far too early to say how the dues structure at OZ may change. Our intention is not necessarily to replace the Fair Share system, but instead to make the necessary changes so that dues are a viable source of income for OZ. With Wayne's penchant for detail and level-headed leadership I'm confident we will see positive changes and I look forward to seeing this work progress. Please let Wayne know if you'd like to be be part of the process.

I ask you to join us on June 11 for the Congregational Meeting to discuss our budget, to celebrate the wonderful work that has been done, and to hear about the opportunities and exciting activities that lie ahead. Rabbi Amy has been our pillar of strength throughout this period of transition. She has provided strong leadership and guidance and has shown the greater community why OZ is a special place, with opportunities for growth. While we are not short on positive attitudes, high energy and hardworking staff and volunteers, still we are no different from other Jewish communities in that we need to grow and adapt while not forgetting or sacrificing who we are. It's a delicate mix and one worth a greater conversation.

At the June meeting and In the coming months you will be hearing about some opportunities that have come to OZ and what we are doing to capture them, embrace them, remain positive and move forward, bearing in mind our financial responsibilities. As a community we should be excited about growing and meeting the needs of the everchanging Jewish world. It's not a question of 'Can we do it and how?' It is a statement: 'We CAN do it, we will come together and make it happen.'

We'll continue to place an emphasis on the community as the primary organizing structure of Jewish life. This is what will pull us together to meet the challenges that arise as we plan for the future of OZ. On behalf of myself and the entire Board of Directors, thank you for your continued support. We look forward to working with you as we start a new chapter.

## FROM THE TREASURER



Shalom *chaverim* (members/ friends),

The Board of Directors approved a proposal from the Finance Committee to repay the endowment for \$212,000 of funds that had been diverted from the Endowment Fund over the previous five years.

The Finance Committee used the work done by Miriam Sturgis and Alice Astarita for the June 2016 Congregational Meeting (adjusted for actual 2015/16 financial results and for the board's commitment to purchase the rooftop solar array at the end of the 5-year IRS recapture period) to arrive at the \$212,000 figure. The board wrestled long and hard over the issue and listened intently to one another; several members changed their positions as we heard each other's concerns. It was a demonstration of Jewish values – respect and integrity – in action.

The Finance Committee has nearly finished the document laying out the financial responsibilities of the OZ board and staff. The committee has also prepared a budget with input from all committees and departments for next year, along with projections for a 3-year budget plan to reverse the current year's budgeted deficit. We look forward to presenting this to all members at the June Congregational Meeting.

It's been great to work with a new board and set of officers. John Blatt, Wayne Senville and Marv Greenberg are dedicated, knowledgeable, hard-working folks and it's great to work with Rabbi Amy, with Grace Oedel, and with all OZ staff.

We are very grateful for everyone's support in member pledges, in Hebrew School support, and all the other ways that you support the great outreach and social justice activities of the synagogue.

And again, I am happy to talk with you if you have questions. I welcome any and all suggestions regarding how we can cut expenses or increase income, and we hope that you will contribute what you can to help OZ meet the needs of our most valuable asset, our members.

# FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I've now been at OZ for a little over six months, and I'm beginning to come up for air and appreciate this beautiful home in which I was lucky enough to land. The first few months of my time here were spent learning systems, getting to know the faces of folks who keep this place running, and beginning

to help create and streamline policies so that we have an easier time running our operations. But as we enter Spring, I'm noticing how we are not just more solid in our roots, but how we are growing and flourishing. We've had an incredibly busy couple of months, and I wanted to share some of the new initiatives that are taking off here at OZ.

I first want to share the joy I've experienced watching family engagement grow. Last Friday at our monthly Tot Shabbat service and potluck dinner, we were packed to the gills with 36 attendees! Tot Shabbat always proves a joyful, cacophonous evening, and outgrowing the room for our service is a great problem to have. We have a member family expecting a baby next month (b'shaa tovah!) who plan to have their baby naming during a Tot Shabbat service—a beautiful testament to the tight crew of families building connection with each other.



Our young professional group self-organized a Passover and created the space for over 20 Jewish young people to celebrate Passover as a community. Another group of young Jewish moms has self-organized into a regular Rosh Hodesh gathering, inspired after several of these women attended one of the Rosh Hodesh events that Rabbi Amy and I hosted here at OZ. The new moms are now meeting on the new moon, deepening relationships and offering support to one another. (Feel free to reach out if you are interested and I can connect you!) Other intergenerational Rosh Hodesh events have been warm and well-attended, and the women have asked that they become a regular part of the program offerings here at OZ. We will be holding those groups quarterly.

Our engagement with the wider community has been strengthening as well. We have been growing a partnership with our neighbors down the street, the Intervale Center, through a series of events and classes. First, we brought our Judaism and the Environment Hebrew School elective to the Intervale to learn about and help with their Spring propagation work. At Lunch & Learn in April, we welcomed Chelsea Frisbee, a brilliant Intervale educator who taught our community about native tree planting as a way to clean watersheds. In May, I will teach a Jewish Food Justice class as a part of the Adult Education series. We'll conclude over the summer with a combination of tikkun olam and fun social time, spending a day helping to glean food at the Intervale, which they will distribute to over 200 members of a completely free, gleaned CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program.



Finally, I want to highlight some new fundraising efforts. In light of the unfortunate recent rise in anti-Semitic incidents in the nation, our Security Fund was formed with the plan to implement much-needed security upgrades to the building. A few key donors saw our deep need for such a fund and made generous donations to help get us get the project off the ground. Using a combination of the Security Fund and the yearly facilities fee we implemented in last year's dues form, we have begun addressing some crucial safety upgrades to the building, making it a safer place to congregate, learn and pray. And in addition to our recent vacation raffle we will once again hold an online auction (see Development Committee column, page 11).

As we come together, deepen relationships, and connect more with the outside world, we build stronger, more meaningful community. If you feel inspired by these efforts, please reach out to me to see how you might get more involved with outreach, engagement or development here at OZ.

# PROFILE: SERGEY & MARINA SHPANER



Like most Purim spiels, the 2017 spiel at Ohavi Zedek conveyed a number of contemporary messages based on the ancient story of King Ahoshverosh, Queen Esther, her uncle Mordechai and the evil Haman. Written by Sergey Shpaner, OZ member and Hebrew School parent, the piece featured Headmaster Mordechai Dorvador and aspiring

Professor Esther Potter at Hogwarts Hebrew School, along with wizards and magic and, of course, bad guy Haman (boo!) Voldemort. (Not to mention subtle references to the politics of the times: rallies at the palace, a call to vet all Muggles, fake news about the coronation, the fabulous service at Voldemort Tower). As always, Purim celebrates the triumph of the Jews over oppression. This year's script, lighthearted treatment notwithstanding, holds deep and personal significance for Sergey and his wife Marina.

Though they met in the States at Cornell University, both are natives of the USSR, she from Moscow and he from Kishinev. The oppressive regime that ruled their early lives was especially harsh for those who identified as Jews. Jewish children suffered both overt and subtle anti-Semitism in school and on the playground, while adults were kept out of universities and held back in the workplace, with no recourse to combat hostility, express opinions, or disagree with official policy.

The fall of the Soviet Union brought relative freedom to practice religion. As a teen in post-Soviet Russia, Marina attended Sunday school, Jewish summer camp and a year-and-a-half of Jewish day school. She compares that to her father's teenage years: as a Jew, despite having earned perfect grades at his secondary school, he had been denied graduation honors and not admitted to university entrance exams. Marina and her parents immigrated to the Bay area in California in 1994, when Marina was 16. After graduating from high school, she enrolled in Cornell University, where her undergraduate studies focused on

molecular and cell biology. In her sophomore year, she recruited other Russian-speakers on campus to organize a Russian-language comedy competition team. Such prepared and impromptu comedy skit competitions were popular at Soviet colleges in the '60s and again from the '80s onwards, and imported by Russian-speaking immigrants into the US and Israel. Some of their shows in New York and Boston drew as many as 5,000 people, Marina notes. Among her recruits was Sergey, a first-year student at the Cornell Law School.

Sergey grew up in Moldova, a former Soviet republic bordered by Romania and Ukraine. The family lived a secular life, their Judaism well under the radar. Still, as a Jewish boy he was subjected to anti-Semitic taunts in school. "At 14, I was the first in my family to enter a synagogue," he says, and he later attended 'underground' Hebrew classes. Hoping to immigrate to America, his entire extended family (including both remarried parents) applied for exit visas. Finally, after months of uncertainty, delays and exorbitant fees, permission to leave was granted in late 1989. Sergey's father and stepmother settled in Cleveland, his mother and stepfather in Bradenton, on the west coast of Florida. Sergey was the only Russian speaker in his high school. He went on to earn a BA at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire in 1997.

Neither Marina nor Sergey have family left in Eastern Europe; both have relatives scattered around the US as well as in Israel, Germany, and Canada.

They were married in September of 2001. The young couple lived in Jersey City, an easy commute to the Battery Park area of lower Manhattan, where Sergey worked for Hughes, Hubbard & Reed practicing business and financial law, and Marina worked for JPMorgan Chase, the banking and financial services firm. They subsequently moved to Secaucus, NJ, another 'bedroom community' of New York City.

Marina worked for three years as a research assistant and lab manager at the Nathan Kline Institute for Psychiatric Research before entering graduate school. She would go on to earn a Ph.D. in Cognitive Neuroscience from City University of New York.

By the end of the decade, the Shpaners were looking to leave the Metropolitan area. "I'd fallen in love with New England when I was a student at Dartmouth," Sergey says. Leveraging his experience in transportation finance law, he took an aircraft finance position in the aerospace

division of Bombardier in Colchester, and the family moved to Vermont. They were at the time the parents of two young children, Naomi, born in 2007, and Benny in 2009. They bought a home near Sam Mazza's farm in Colchester. Marina finished her dissertation in 2010 and found work in the MindBody Medical Center at UVM's College of Medicine as a researcher. She is the author or co-author of numerous articles, and has recently added teaching to her responsibilities. Son Daniel joined the family in 2014.

A year ago, Bombardier closed its Vermont location, and while Sergey had the opportunity to move to Montreal and remain with the company, the family chose to stay here and gamble on finding new opportunities. Sergey renewed his license to practice law in New York and obtained his Vermont license. He is keeping busy, primarily consulting for Dealer.com. "I'm my own boss at the moment," he says. He also used his transition time to finish the science-fiction novel he'd started years ago in New Jersey, and is now looking to publish it.

When they lived in Jersey City, the Shpaners were members of a Conservative synagogue in the neighboring city of Hoboken with a dynamic and inspiring rabbi, Robert Scheinberg.\* They were pleased to find an engaging Conservative shul in Burlington as well, with a thriving Hebrew School. "Jewish education is important to us," Marina says. She has taken an active role on the Hebrew School Committee and is serving on the OZHS visioning task force, charged with investigating models of education in other congregations that might help us further improve our programming. In addition, she helps with the Sunday preschool play group, has trained to become a mashajach to facilitate brunches and Hebrew School forays into the OZ kitchen, and served as director of the Purim spiel. According to Principal Naomi Barell (and to Sergey as well), Marina is the first to volunteer for anything and everything.

Outside of the synagogue, she is starting a Havdalah Book Club for 9 to 11-year-olds and their parents, in conjunction with the PJ Library. She hopes eventually to engage ten to fifteen families. At home Marina and Sergey oversee the myriad activities in which one or more of their kids are involved, including skiing, hockey, lacrosse, tennis, soccer, ballet and piano. They speak to the children in Russian. Like many native-born Europeans, Sergey is multilingual, fluent not only in Russian and English, but also proficient in French and Italian; Marina speaks Hebrew.

Sergey has contributed his creative talents to OZ by penning the two most recent Purim spiels. The 2016 Star Wars theme took us to a galaxy far, far away, and 2017 found us at Hogwarts; however, each year the characters and their roles remain the same: the dominance of Ahoshverosh, Haman's wickedness, Esther's bravery and Mordechai's wisdom. Again and again, we relive the ancient Purim tale that reinforces the necessity of strong, ethical leadership, the importance of a well-informed, open minded citizenry, and the triumph of good over evil.

And then, of course, we party. (See photos, p. 18.)

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# HEBREW SCHOOL NEWS



I write this in the midst of Passover. How wonderful it was to recently celebrate the holiday with friends, family and co-workers to continue this millennia-long seder practice! We shared old family traditions of recipes, songs and jokes and sprinkled in some new ones I learned

at OZHS! Yes, even the principal can learn new tricks! Our highlight, besides dinner, was engaging in the Persian Passover custom of beating each other with scallions! Our table was adorned with old and new as well – an inherited silver hand washer, an orange and beet on the seder plate, Miriam's cup made by a dear friend filled with water and plastic jumping frogs. These practices, in turn, will become my children's traditions, and they too will add and revise for the next generation. Even with all this change, we still keep the essence of why we celebrate alive – to remember the story of the Exodus and rejoice in our freedom from slavery.

I am just about to complete my seventh year as Principal at OZHS. Hard to believe. It still feels as fun and exciting as it did when I started. In looking over the years, I see how the program here has evolved. There has been quite a bit of change, but the essence of my goals has always remained the same: for our students to feel connected-to a greater Jewish community, to our history, to our rich customs and traditions and to our ethics. Our approach has changed over time to incorporate more hands-on, experiential learning, a keener focus on spoken Hebrew, exposing students to different social groupings, bringing the whole school together for holiday celebrations and more. All this change in the name of giving our kids a positive, relevant, Jewish learning environment.

OZHS is not where it was seven years ago, nor where it was 15, 30 or 50 years ago. I think that is a good thing. We must always adapt to our circumstances in order to respond to our community's needs and thrive. Our Jewish Family Engagement Task Force will be meeting over the next few months to continue our good work in looking at other models of learning throughout the country to consider new ideas for our school and congregation. I look forward to this with enthusiasm for our future.

- OZ joined many Christians in supporting the Islamic Society of Vermont at prayer after the Colchester mosque received hate mail.
- The Social Action Committee fully endorsed and signed the Ohavi Zedek statement against the immigration ban, co-authored by Rabbi Amy and Ilyse Morgenstein Fuerst, Grace Oedel and Naomi Barell.
- Members of the Social Action Committee attended the rally in Montpelier at which Rabbi Amy spoke against the ban.
- Rabbi Amy has created new deeper and stronger interfaith connections through the Children of Abraham program. This program was led by our rabbi in conjunction with Pastor Ken White of the College Street Congregational Church and Imam Islam Hassan of the Islamic Society of Vermont, and with the support of Rev. Laura Engelken of the UVM Interfaith Center. The seven people from each congregation who joined for a week of intensive study and prayer have been the root of many efforts to create events that allow the communities as a whole to learn more about each other and to join in social action.

One such effort was the Friday evening service/potluck dinner on April 7 to which the Imam and others from his congregation were invited. After eating, we discussed future actions, such as a joint service project to help people in need, for example feeding the homeless. In addition, there were discussions about how we can learn more about each other and get to know each other better. One possibility discussed was home-to-home visits. The Social Action Committee will consider facilitating some outreach programs along these lines.




