Cantor Steve: Thanked Rabbi Amy for words of Torah. Work together, support each other as a community. Thanked the Exec team for work on this decision and hours, work, and heart on the work on the process. First time to address the board. Thrilled that senior spiritual leader is an opportunity. I've worked 3 years beside Rabbi Amy. I feel like I'm ready to take on the torch of being senior member of the community. Everyone brought something into the mishcan- it's everyone's gifts. My model of leadership is to lead in partnership with all of you. My strength is listening and see people where they are and bringing them into a sense of

belonging. I am well positioned to bring us

	to a place of thriving. Whether they are an insider or excluded, I am excited to bring them in in meaningful way. The Relational Judaism Handbook. Is a great book that defines where we should go.
	Suzanne: Reading article about high rate of intermarriage- how can a synagogue can be successful with interfaith families. What plans do you have in including that? Does OZ recognize children of a JEwsih father or just a Jewish mother?
	Key issue today, especially in Conservative Movement. We are not able to perform interfaith weddings. Many synagogues have broken with the movement, we are not nearly ready to do so. How do you welcome people if you can't perform a wedding? There are so many other ways. Make people feel welcome at our services. So many of us are informed by many spiritual services. Strong multi-faith ties with different groups and person to person. Constantly creating community with those around us.
	Does the Conservative Judaism recognize patrilineal lineage? We recognize matrilineal descent or conversion. We find ways to find rituals that do not other people. They can be in the Hebrew School. We have created ways for conversion for patrilineal consent, blessings for the Torah that are particular for Jews and we make sure people feel included. It will be an ongoing conversation
	Rebecca: Currently in the membership committee there is a prospect with a father who is Jewish, how do we proceed? How you envision being the senior person and having a halftime Rabbi? Everyone is thinking about that model and different models. Cantor Steve as primary spiritual leader, in tandem to make large decisions. p/t rabbi commit to be part/time 2-3 days/week for our many needs: pastoral

needs, gets call or visit they need. Make sure all pastoral needs are met. On services, especially high holidays it's especially hard to lead prayer and services. Prayer gets the level of engagement and learning and deepness with multiple leaders. Also a large ley led services. P/t rabbi help with Jewish Law- Cantor Steve does not have the same training as an ordained Rabbi. This would make sure questions answered with the depth of Jewish tradition. Focus on Social Justice - someone to bounce ideas on- what are the areas we can address? (or Rabbinical intern) Josh Kernoff- thank you for comments and enthusiasm, we are so grateful. You and p/t or half/time. How we make that work financially, logistically, how we find that person. What do you see as the biggest challenge? Cantor Steve: I can be the primary spiritual leader, if we're not able to find a p/t rabbi, the support is Rabbinically, also administratively. I see we will have a need for an ED, might take care of a lot of programming. If we're not able to hire a p/t rabbi, a rabbinic intern could do a lot of work. I respect the need for a Rabbi with smicha, who has been ordained. I hope we're able to find a high level p/t rabbi. OZ could be a great destination for someone. 		have enough time to get everything done.  Something has to give. What are some of the things that are beyond what one person can do? What will have to be set aside because you can't do it all?
		Cantor Steve's Prioritization. Identify where I have to hold areas and where I can let go. Davening- present for all, but vision is to teach others to lead. Davening and sermon can be shared- to give a richer experience when shared. I'm working with Yoram and Jeff to identify what I can give up. Hebrew School and Preschool is important. The way to get there will be a partnership with lay leadership. Rabbi Amy's models of circleslarger community, and also part of smaller circles. Hosting Shabbat dinners. Social Justice work. It doesn't have to be clergy doing everything, but many people are very capable of leading programs. Not a Chavurah, b/c there is still a clergy, but the idea of a chavurah where it is shared. It's a work in progress.
